

Bringing Orthodoxy to America"

ecently Fr. Steven, along with Manny Manos, travelled to Portland, Oregon for the "Bringing Orthodoxy to America" conference presented by the Commission for Orthodox Missions and Evangelism (C.O.M.E.) of the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of San Francisco. The following is the overall summary and lasting impressions of the conference sessions.

Beaverton, Oregon is a small suburb of Portland, just west of the Willamette River. When most people think of Beaverton, they think of Nike, the \$19 billion international athletic apparel manufacturer that is based there. However, just across the street from its newly-expanded 5.4 million square foot world headquarters is a small, yet vibrant Greek Orthodox parish.

Saint John the Baptist, which started with six families in 1997, has now converted a small empty warehouse into the spiritual home for over 130 families. Fr. Theodore Dorrance, has vigilantly ministered to its young and thriving faithful body since its inception, and still does today. He was gracious enough to host this retreat, and showcase the incredible kinds of growth that a missionminded parish can acheive in just a few years.

While the conference was a ministry of the Metropolis of San Francisco, the participants and the presenters came from all over the Archdiocese. First was the keynote speaker, Fr. Luke Veronis who is the professor of Missions and Evange-

lism at the Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology in Brookline, Massachussetts. The sessions that followed the next morning were



led by Fr. Evan Armatas from St. Spyridon in Loveland, Colorado; and the firery Fr. Barnabas Powell from Saints Raphael, Nicholas, and Irene in Cumming, Georgia.

While each presentation focused on a separate aspect of outreach, all of the presenters maintained the same constant theme: "If we fail to bring Orthodoxy to our neighbors, our parishes will die and America will never have a chance to experience the True Faith of Christ!" This means that we must take a critical look at our parish, and the way we interact with our surrounding communities. We must challenge ourselves to look outside our four walls, and invite those near us to share in the life in Christ offered in the Orthodox Church!

There is great power and Grace in the unity of faithful Christians. At Saint Mark we know this Grace well, and invite all our parishioners to our Parish Assembly to discuss where the Grace of the Holy Spirit may lead us in the years to come.

HOLY COMMUNION & MENSTRUATION

...... (A LETTER FROM ST. GREGORY THE GREAT TO ST. AUGUSTINE)

The following text is from a letter sent by St. Gregory the Great, Bishop of Rome (depicted on the left), to St. Augustine of Canterbury. Please (depicted on the right) note that some of his language reflects the time in which this was written (6th century) but the bottom line is that a woman's period should not keep her from receiving communion.

A WOMAN SHOULD NOT BE FORBIDDEN to enter the Church during the times of her monthly period; for the workings of nature cannot be considered sinful, and it



is not right that she should be refused admittance since her condition is beyond her control. We know that the woman who suffered an issue of blood, humbly approaching behind our Lord, touched the hem of his robe and was at once healed of her sickness. If, therefore, the woman was right to touch our Lord's robe, why may one who endures the workings of nature not be permitted to enter the church of God? And if it is objected that the woman in the Gospels was compelled by disease while these latter are bound by custom, then remember, my brother, that everything that we endure in this mortal body through the infirmity of its nature is justly ordained by God since the fall of man. For hunger, thirst, heat, cold and weariness originate in this infirmity of our nature; and our search for food against hunger, drink against thirst, coolness against heat, clothing against cold, and rest against weariness is only our attempt to obtain some remedy in our weakness. In this sense the menstrual flow in the woman is an illness. So if it was a laudable presumption of the woman who, in her disease, touched our Lord's robe, why may not the same concession be granted to all women who endure the weakness of their nature?

A woman, therefore, should not be forbidden to receive the Mystery of Communion at these times. If any, out of a deep sense of reverence, do not presume to do so, this is commendable. But if they do so, they do nothing blameworthy. Sincere people often acknowledge their faults even when there is no actual fault, because a blameless action may often spring from a fault. For instance, eating when we are hungry is no fault, yet being hungry (in our present way) originates in Adam's sin.

Similarly, the monthly courses of women are no fault. They are caused by nature. But the defilement of our nature is apparent even when we have no deliberate intention to do evil, and this defilement springs from sin. So may we recognize the judgment which our sin brings upon us. And so may people who sinned willingly bear the punishment of their sin unwillingly.

Therefore when women, after due consideration, do not presume to approach the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of the Lord during their monthly period, they are to be commended. But if they are moved by devout love of this Holy Mystery to receive it as pious practice suggests that they do, they are not to be discouraged. For while the Old Testament makes outward observances important, the New Testament does not regard these things as highly as the inward disposition, which is the sole criterion for allotting punishment. For instance, the Law forbids the eating of many things as unclean, but in the Gospel the Lord says: "Not that which goes into the mouth defiles a person, but that which comes out of the mouth, this defiles a man." He also said, "Out of the mouth proceed evil thoughts" (See Mark 7:18-20). Here Almighty God shows clearly that evil actions spring from the root of evil thoughts. Similarly the apostle Paul says: "To the pure all things are pure, but to the corrupt and unbelieving nothing is pure. And later he indicates the cause of their corruption, adding, "For their very minds and consciences are defiled" (Titus 1:15). If, therefore, no food is unclean to one of a pure mind, how can a woman who endures the laws of nature with a pure mind be considered impure?

AN INTERVIEW WITH OUR STEWARDS KATHI SHARP INTERVIEWING JULIE & TED VAGELOS

This week Stewardship Committee member Kathi Sharp had the chance to sit down with Julie and Ted Vagelos in the sixth installation of our series of interviews spotlighting some of our Saint Mark stewards. This is an ongoing forum in which we are able to learn from our brothers and sisters what being an Orthodox steward means to them.

KATHI SHARP (KS): Julie & Ted, you are relatively new to the parish, but have made quite an impact on our Saint Mark family in just over a year-and-a-half. Would you please tell us a little about your family?

JULIE & TED: We have been married for 18 years and have two daughters, Stephy (13) and Ally (11). After visiting Saint Mark multiple times a year for many

years during our South Florida visits, we relocated to Parkland Florida about 18 months ago from New Jersey. Our daughters Stephy and Ally attend Westglades Middle School in Parkland. Stephy is in eighth grade and loves her dance program at Dance Theater in Parkland. Ally is in sixth grade and loves her gymnastics program at Gymnastics Plus in Boca Raton. Both girls have joined Syrtaki, and

definitely keep us busy between dance, gymnastics, church, and social events. We all love the beach, Florida sunshine, and Saint Mark family!

[KS]: How long have you been a member of the Orthodox Church?

(TED): Well, I have been a member of the Greek Orthodox Church since my baptism in 1960 at Saint Spyridon in New York City. I remember growing up as an active acolyte since I was 6, and eventually I was tonsured as a reader by Bishop Silas when I was a teenager. As my career moved me across the country, I remained active with the Church serving on the Parish Council in parishes in Nashville, TN; Oakland, CA; and Westfield, NJ.

(JULIE): I became a member of the Orthodox Church through Chrismation shortly before our wedding in 1998. We both wanted to raise our family in one faith.

(KS): What does Saint Mark and Orthodoxy mean to you and your family?

Mark for many years during family vacations before our actual move to South Florida, so when Ted was offered a position in Miami, there was no question in our minds which church we would join. When we let both of our daughters know



that we were moving, they were very concerned but both girls described being able to be part of the Saint Mark's family as a "bonus" and a bright spot in the impending move. We will never forget that on that first visit to the Saint Mark's office, less than one hour after landing in Florida, Father Mark took the time to sit down with us, and welcome us to the parish...

(TED): ...And then, from our first Sunday as stewards of the church we were welcomed and made to feel a part of the Saint Mark Family. The rich tradition of the Greek Orthodox church coupled with the parish's 'philoxenia' reinforced our belief that we selected the perfect parish to raise our family.


[KS]: God had endowed us with personal talents and gifts. What is your greatest talent and how will you use it for the glory of God at our Saint Mark's parish?

COULTE: One of Ted's talents, public speaking, was actually developed while he served in the Altar. At the age of 8, Ted was asked to lead the congregation reading the Lord's Prayer. By the time Ted was 10, Ted was leading the congregation reading the Nicene Creed, and when Ted turned 12 he began reading The Epistle during the Divine Liturgy (which Ted has continued to do for the past 44 years).

Outside of church, literally, Ted has been the voice behind numerous Greek Festivals and even travels up to Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Westfield each year to emcee the NJ Greek Fest. During services you won't see Ted in the pews as he is using his communications talents in the back of the Altar to live stream the services on the Internet. He also video edits and publishes the homily, the "What We Believe,"

and the Divine Liturgy on the Saint Mark You Tube Channel weekly. These broadcasts are regularly watched by our shutins and snowbirds as well as hundreds of people throughout the United States and in over ten International countries.

(TED): Julie has been involved in religious education (Sunday School) since she was a teenager in the Catholic Church. Julie brought her talents to the Greek Orthodox Church after her Chrismation. For seven years Julie served as the Second Grade Sunday School teacher at Holy Trinity in Westfield. Julie loves being part of the Saint Mark Sunday Church School ministry by helping the teachers and the students with lessons, crafts, supplies, snacks and the gospel readings. Julie is well organized and likes helping with the administration of the church school program. She loves seeing the smiling faces of the children each Sunday.
